The Smithsonian Environmental Research Center (SERC) hosted our Fall 2000 meeting at their excellent meeting facilities in Edgewater, Maryland near Annapolis. Nearly 100 attended the technical and social sessions which began with a meeting of Society of African-American Marine and Estuarine Scientists (see more about SAAMES on page 3), a board meeting, and the traditional beverage consumption event on Thursday evening the 9th of November. On November 9th, a meeting of African–American graduate students was held at the fall meeting of the Atlantic Estuarine Research Society (AERS) at the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center (SERC) in Edgewater, Maryland. Organized by the Society of African–American Marine and Estuarine Scientists (SAAMES), the students were provided with an informal forum to meet and share ideas. Though very short notice prevented many who wanted to at-

Student Awards

AERS is very committed to student development. Over the years the number of student awards has risen from one to the current four special student awards. The best undergraduate, Master's level, and Doctoral level presenters and the best poster presentation are awarded. The judges agreed that the quality of this particular meeting's group of presentations and posters made it exceedingly hard to select the winners.

Jim Hagy of the UMCES Chesapeake Biological Laboratory in Solomons, MD gave the best Doctoral level presentation with his work, "Hypoxia in Chesapeake Bay, 1950-1999: Progressive Development and River Flow Effects." The best Master's level presentation and the best Undergraduate level presentations came back to back at the meeting. R.L. Arenson of VIMS was the best Master's level presentation with her work entitled, "Hydric Soils Temperatures, the growing Season, and Implications for Wetland Delineation in Southeast Virginia." While O.A. Glahn of Salisbury State University gave the best Under-

graduate presentation entitled, "Spatial Variability in Porewater Biogeochemistry of Two Chesapeake Bay Marshes." AERS agreed to host the meeting and Tuck Hines Assistant Director of SERC provided on-site housing for participants, meeting facilities, and refreshments.

Abstracts are being solicited for the spring meeting, and must be submitted by February 22, 2001. Electronic submission of abstracts is strongly encouraged. The preferred form for submission is using the form for abstract submission available at the following address: http://www.vims.edu/aers/spring2001registration.htm. Please follow the submission instructions included at the site. If you cannot access this website, abstracts may be e-mailed to Beth Hinchey, the AERS Program Chair, at ehinchey@vims.edu. As a last resort, a diskette copy of the abstract file can be submitted in a text file to Beth Hinchey, Virginia Institute of Marine Science, College of William and Mary, Gloucester Point, VA 23062. Please label the diskette with author, title, and software used. Abstracts should begin with the title, names and affiliations of the author(s), and be followed by the text (250 words or less). If there is a preference, please specify if the presentation is a poster or oral presentation. If coauthored, identify the name of the presenter. If the presenter is a student, please identify the student's status as undergraduate, MS or PhD in parentheses in the abstract. Due to anticipated attendance at the meeting, all presenters are strongly encouraged to submit their abstracts early. Please include an email address and/or phone number with all abstract submissions to facilitate communication in the event of any problems.

From the Bay Bridge Tunnel:

Take 13 South (Northhampton Blvd.) to I-64 East.

Take Exit 284A off of I-64 and get onto I-264 West (Downtown Norfolk).

After 4 miles, take Exit 9 (Waterside Dr.).

Go through 8 stoplights. Turn right onto Freemason Street. Enter the hotel parking lot on the left-hand side of Freemason St.

From Northwest of Norfolk:

Take I-64 east towards Norfolk. Take Exit 284A off of I-64 and follow the directions as above.
